 - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. So you're seeing a therapist?

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- Q. Did she prepare an affidavit in support of your --

 - Q. Have you talked to her about your name change?
 - A. I have. When I first met her, she asked me if there was any preferred name that I would like to go by and I told her that it would be Rowan. She identified me as such from thereon. And then I told her about the conflict I had with changing my name.
 - Q. Did she recommended to you that your name be changed?
 - A. Yes, she did, on the basis that it is crucial to people who have -- are diagnosed with gender dysphoria and that don't identify with the sex they are -- the sex that they don't identify with at birth.

She said that it is dangerous for me to have a female sounding because it could be a potential hazard for people who look at my ID: potential employers and people -- potential lessors, and anybody that looks at my ID.

- Q. Are you also taking medical therapy?
- A. I am taking hormone replacement therapy with testosterone shots.
 - Q. Have you ever been charged with a crime?
- 24 | A. No, sir.
 - Q. Do you have any criminal history, beyond traffic

violation or anything like that? 2 Α. No, sir. 3 Are you asking the Court to change your name --Q. 4 Α. Yes, sir. 5 -- to Rowan Elijah Feldhaus? 6 Yes, sir. Α. 7 MR. HUNTER: I have no further questions, Your Honor. 8 THE COURT: What's that affidavit going to tell me? 9 MR. You said --5 There was a spike after -- it looks THE PETITIONER: 6 like after 2005 that has become popular about both female 7 and male names. THE COURT: Well, is there a -- does it tell me or 8 9 tell you what the percentages are today or sometime in the 10 recent, within the last five years? 11 THE PETITIONER: I could calculate a percentage, 12 It just has the popularity chart. It's a point 13 graph chart. 14 It tells how many people in a year are MR. HUNTER: 1.5 named this and how many people are -- as a male and how 16 many as a female. 17 THE COURT: Well, how many? I was just pointing that out, Judge. 18 MR. HUNTER: 19 can --20 THE PETITIONER: 2015, 700 are popular among girls 21 and close to 1,250 for males. 22 THE COURT: All right. 2.3 Anything else? 24 MR. HUNTER: No, Your Honor.

RULING BY THE COURT

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THE COURT: I think that Mr. Hunter knows my position on name changes like this and I know he has related it to you because y'all came in today prepared to make a case.

You've made your case with regard to the name Rowan.

But to change your name from Rebeccah Elizabeth to Rowan

Elijah, I am not going to do that. You're thin on Rowan,

but you made your case, so I am going to accept that. But

you've got to find something else that's gender-neutral.

Here's my position, and I'm putting it on the record so, if this case gets appealed, the appellate court knows exactly what I think.

I do not approve of changing names from male to female -- male names to obvious female names, and vice versa. I think that it is misleading to the public. I think that it is dangerous in some circumstances for one -- for the public not to know whether they're dealing with a male or female.

You have not said that you were born anything other than a normal -- sexually normal female; not that I would let that sway my opinion one way or the other, but I have never had anyone in my court that had a physical abnormality that I had to deal with in a situation like this.

But I am convinced that the legislature gave the

superior court the discretion to approve name changes and disapprove name changes. I disapproved one last week that didn't have anything to do with the issue that we have before us today. But I think it would have been misleading to the public and I think the guy was trying to be smart. I think he was trying to be smart. And I would not allow one part of the name change that he wanted to make. But he was happy when we left court. He still got his last name changed. Well, actually, his whole name was changed, if you want to know the truth.

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In any event, you brought up -- I believe you brought up the issue that -- the reason that I will allow a name change to something that I find to be significantly -- significant enough to be gender-neutral is not for your benefit. You are a collateral beneficiary of the reason I do it.

The reason I do it is because of the people that have to look at your ID, the people that have to look at your name, the people that have look at you and say, what's going on here, the 17-year-old kid who's ringing you up at the grocery store and when you want to cash a check, or whatever it is, and you produce a credit card or an ID that is obviously inconsistent with your appearance and he or she doesn't know what to do.

I do it for the -- almost contrary to my position

that it has confusing to the general public, I will allow a gender-neutral name change that will benefit the general public because I don't want them to have to go through the embarrassing issue of trying to figure out what to do with you when you present, in your appearance today, with a female name, particularly if you had on a uniform and you were dressed like a man. You would pass as male.

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I have other reasons. I have reasons that relate to impure motives that some people have in changing their identity so that they will have access to public facilities that they would not otherwise have access to.

But I will not -- I am not going to change your name to Rowan Elijah. You've got to come up with something else. I'll take Rowan. And it's thin on that. But I agree that it is -- that it could be -- I would always assume it to be male, but you've made your point. I mean, if seven against 12 are female, then that's close. It's similar to other such names. I'm not talking about names like Bobby or whatever that are commonly -- maybe Shawn or some other name that is commonly given male or female.

There are more today than there were 50 years ago that are -- Morgan is an acceptable female name today. You would have never -- 50 years ago, you would have never heard of a female being named Morgan. So there are names out there.

So I am not -- I want you to know that I'm not totally denying your petition. I'm not just going to slap a denial on it, unless you tell me that you want to go forward with this name, and then I'll deny it and you can appeal me to the court of appeals and we'll see.

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But I think that the Court -- if this Court does not have the discretion to rule on name changes that is before it, then the legislature needs to change -- it's not for me to say, it is for the legislature to say. And the legislature is not going to touch this with a 10-foot pole.

But it is something that needs to be changed by the legislature, not by the courts. I'm not here to make the law. I think I have the discretion. If I didn't, then they would give this job to the clerk, instead of to a superior court judge, and all you would have to do is go in and fill out some papers with the clerk or the probate court or whatever and change your name. That's not our system.

MR. HUNTER: So it's possible to amend with another middle name?

I need to talk to my client about that.

THE COURT: But, you know -- I'm sorry. I'm not sorry, but I'm sorry that I can't resolve this case today in a manner that would be acceptable to y'all and

1 acceptable to me. But when you go to a name of Rowan 2 Elijah, I mean, nobody is going to ever say that that is 3 not a male name, regardless of the fact that Rowan is used 4 both ways. 5 I understand Elijah can be used as a middle name. 6 could have been her mother's name or something like that. 7 But that's not what we've got here today and so I don't 8 have to rule on it. 9 MR. HUNTER: I'll talk to my client. In those terms, I believe that most --10 11 THE COURT: Don't speculate on the record. Talk to 12 your client. Thank you, Your Honor. 13 MR. HUNTER: 14 (WHEREUPON, Counsel and Petitioner conferred.) 1.5 THE COURT: I'm not going to accept that. I mean, 16 I'm just -- I don't know anybody named Elijah who's 17 female. I'm not going to do that. I've never heard of 18 that. And I know who Elijah was, one of the greatest men 19 that ever lived. 20 All right. 21 Thank you, Your Honor. MR. That based on my review and counseling with the Petitioner, it is my opinion that the Petitioner is transgender, meaning that his self-identity does not conform to the sex assigned to him by doctors at birth and is therefore diagnosed with Gender Dysphoria, a condition recognized in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Health Disorders as a diagnosis used by psychologists and physicians to describe people who experience significant distress between the sex and gender they were assigned at birth and their gender identity.

The name change for which the Petitioner has requested is critical among the recommended treatment criteria in order to alleviate the symptoms of Gender Dysphoria and securing a legal name is necessary in making the legal identity and lived experience of the Petitioner match.
